Power 9® Reverse Engineering Longevity

Life expectancy of an American born today averages 78.2 years. But this year, over 70,000 Americans have reached their 100th birthday. What are they doing that the average American isn't (or won't?)

To answer the question, we teamed up with National Geographic to find the world's longest-lived people and study them. We knew most of the answers lied within their lifestyle and environment (The Danish Twin Study established that only about 20% of how long the average person lives is determined by genes.). Then we worked with a team of demographers to find pockets of people around the world with the highest life expectancy, or with the highest proportions of people who reach age 100.

We found five places that met our criteria:

- Barbagia region of Sardinia Mountainous highlands of inner Sardinia with the world's highest concentration of male centenarians.
- Ikaria, Greece Aegean Island with one of the world's lowest rates of middle age mortality and the lowest rates of dementia.
- Nicoya Peninsula, Costa Rica World's lowest rates of middle age mortality, second highest concentration of male centenarians.
- Seventh Day Adventists Highest concentration is around Loma Linda, California. They live 10 years longer than their North American counterparts.
- Okinawa, Japan Females over 70 are the longest-lived population in the world.

We then assembled a team of medical researchers, anthropologists, demographers, and epidemiologists to search for evidence-based common denominators among all places. We found nine:

1. Move Naturally

The world's longest-lived people don't pump iron, run marathons or join gyms. Instead, they live in environments that constantly nudge them into moving without thinking about it. They grow gardens and don't have mechanical conveniences for house and yard work.

2. Purpose

The Okinawans call it "Ikigai" and the Nicoyans call it "plan de vida;" for both it translates to "why I wake up in the morning." Knowing your sense of purpose is worth up to seven years of extra life expectancy.

3. Down Shift

Even people in the Blue Zones experience stress. Stress leads to chronic inflammation, associated with every major agerelated disease. What the world's longest-lived people have that we don't are routines to shed that stress. Okinawans take a few moments each day to remember their ancestors, Adventists pray, Ikarians take a nap and Sardinians do happy hour.

4. 80% Rule

"Hara hachi bu" – the Okinawan, 2500-year old Confucian mantra said before meals reminds them to stop eating when their stomachs are 80 percent full. The 20% gap between not being hungry and feeling full could be the difference between losing weight or gaining it. People in the Blue Zones eat their smallest meal in the late afternoon or early evening and then they don't eat any more the rest of the day.

5. Plant Slant

Beans, including fava, black, soy and lentils, are the cornerstone of most centenarian diets. Meat—mostly pork—is eaten on average only five times per month. Serving sizes are 3-4 oz., about the size of deck or cards.

6. Wine @ 5

People in all Blue Zones (except Adventists) drink alcohol moderately and regularly. Moderate drinkers outlive nondrinkers. The trick is to drink 1-2 glasses per day (preferably Sardinian Cannonau wine), with friends and/or with food. And no, you can't save up all weekend and have 14 drinks on Saturday.

7. Belong

All but five of the 263 centenarians we interviewed belonged to some faith-based community. Denomination doesn't seem to matter. Research shows that attending faith-based services four times per month will add 4-14 years of life expectancy.

8. Loved Ones First

Successful centenarians in the Blue Zones put their families first. This means keeping aging parents and grandparents nearby or in the home (It lowers disease and mortality rates of children in the home too.). They commit to a life partner (which can add up to 3 years of life expectancy) and invest in their children with time and love (They'll be more likely to care for you when the time comes).

9. Right Tribe

The world's longest lived people chose–or were born into–social circles that supported healthy behaviors, Okinawans created "moais"–groups of five friends that committed to each other for life. Research from the Framingham Studies shows that smoking, obesity, happiness, and even loneliness are contagious. So the social networks of long-lived people have favorably shaped their health behaviors.

To make it to age 100, you have to have won the genetic lottery. But most of us have the capacity to make it well into our early 90's and largely without chronic disease. As the Adventists demonstrate, the average person's life expectancy could increase by 10-12 years by adopting a Blue Zones lifestyle.

10 Blue Zones® Food Guidelines

We distilled more than 150 dietary surveys of the world's longest-lived people to distill the average longevity diet. These 10 simple guidelines reflect how the world's longest-lived people ate for most of their lives. By adopting some of the healthy eating principles into you daily life, you too can live longer, better.

95/5 RULE...

Eat Plants. 95 percent of your food should be fruits, vegetables, grains, greens, beans, and fruits. Use olive oil to sauté and spices flavor vegetables. Feel free to eat a cup (cooked) of whole grains daily.

LIMIT MEAT...

Think of meat as a celebratory food. Portions should be no larger than a deck of cards, once or twice a week. Avoid processed meats such as hot dogs, bacon and sausages.

FISH IS FINE...

Enjoy fish up to three times weekly. Wild-caught salmon or smaller fish like sardines, trout, snapper, cod, and anchovies are okay choices. Limit portion sizes to 3 ounces (about the size of the palm of your hand.)

DIMINISH DAIRY...

Avoid dairy when possible. If cheese is a must, try ice-cube size portions of sheep (pecorino) or goat (feta) cheese to flavor foods. If you eat eggs, limit intake to 3/week.

DAILY DOSE OF BEANS...

Eat a cup of beans daily spread out across breakfast, lunch or dinner. All beans count, including tofu. They contain high quality protein and fiber. If you buy canned beans, avoid added salt, sugar and chemicals.

SLASH SUGAR...

Consume only 28 grams (7 teaspoons) of added sugar daily. Reserve cookies, cakes, and candies for special occasions. Read labels and avoid foods with more than 8 grams of sugar. Make honey your go-to sweetener.

SNACK ON NUTS...

Eat a handful of nuts daily: almonds, pistachios, walnuts, hazelnuts, sunflower seeds, pumpkin seeds, Brazil nuts, and peanuts. Try different nuts so you don't tire of them. Avoid sugar-coated nuts.

SOUR ON BREAD...

Eat only 100% whole grain breads or authentic sourdough bread made from live cultures. Limit bread to two slices daily. Chose whole grain corn tortillas over flour tortillas. Avoid white breads and wraps.

GO WHOLLY WHOLE...

Try to eat only whole foods or processed foods with fewer than 5 ingredients: If it's manufactured in a plant, avoid it. If it comes from a plant, eat it.

DRINK MOSTLY WATER...

Drink six glasses of water daily. Feel free to drink unsweetened teas and coffee. Enjoy Wine at 5 with friends or with Blue Zones inspired meals. Avoid all sugar-sweetened and diet sodas.



- **Restore –** Restorative sleep, a minimum of 6 hours, with 7-8 being optimal, can increase BDNF (brain-derived neurotrophic factor) which repairs the brain at night; neurons and glia regenerate at night; the brain clears out toxins at night reducing amyloid build-up; helps maintain hippocampal and brain volume size. Deep sleep is where the brain organizes and cleanses. (201)
- **Optimize "Build Cognitive Reserve -** "Chunking", association, method of loci, music, navigation (cab drivers), second language, music, dance, formal education, complexed professions, uncomfortable challenges, social interaction. (231) he Alzheimer's Solution, 2017:79-270

Anti-Aging Benefits of Strength Training

Research from the Penn State College of Medicine, the University of Sydney, and Columbia University has determined that regular strength training has major benefits for longevity.

<u>Moving naturally</u> is an integral part of a Blue Zones lifestyle. Most centenarians did not belong to gyms, run marathons, or pump iron. Instead, natural movement like walking to work and climbing stairs and working their muscles by doing manual labor like gardening and household chores were built into their daily lives. Unfortunately for most of us, natural movement has been engineered out of our lives. The below advice from Marilynn Preston has some good ideas for those looking to start doing some weight-bearing exercise.

Marilynn Preston spent 40 years as a journalist, with 18 years at the Chicago Tribune. She has been a regular commentator on NPR and PBS and is the founding chair of Girls in the Game, a non-profit that helps girls get the support they need to become strong, healthy women. This is adapted from Preston's latest book, <u>All Is Well: The Art (And Science) of Personal Well-Being</u>, and takes a look at how to make healthy lifestyle changes and what you need to know to make positive changes in your life.

There are good reasons for strength training beyond looking good in a bikini. Strong bodies are linked to strong minds. Strength training builds confidence, muscle and healthy tissue. It's also good for stable joints, injury prevention and weight loss. And yet—slugs that we are— fewer than 25 percent of Americans over the age of 45 work with weights or do strength training on a regular basis. A whole lot fewer, I'm guessing.

Blame it on our sedentary lifestyles. The heaviest thing most of us lift is our laptop. Nothing we do requires us to raise our arms over our heads. So for all those reasons and a superset more, here are eight strength-training truths to consider—as you decide how and when you'll get started:

There's No Age Limit...

Little kids have to wait until their bodies and bones are strong enough to take the stresses of weight training, but the rest of us can start where we are, and can expect to see big improvements over time. The body is magnificent that way. People in their 90s are pumping iron and getting stronger, and so will you, once you understand the basics.

Technique Is Everything... This is a weighty matter, because if you don't learn to lift consciously, with awareness of your breath, posture, core, and limitations, you can strain a muscle or tear a tendon. Find an evolved teacher/trainer, or teach yourself from books or online videos.

Lift Heavier Weights...

You won't get stronger lifting the same five- or ten-pound weight day after day, rep after rep. For your muscles to grow stronger, you need to challenge them—gradually, over time—with heavier weights. The "right" amount of weight will always vary, but this principle remains the same: You should be able to do ten or so reps with perfect form, with the last two being a real struggle.

In Or Out Of The Gym...

Both will build strength. Using machines in a gym usually come with a price tag. Free weights speak for themselves: anytime, anywhere. Machines have a limited range of motion; free weights have infinite possibilities. Both can work if you work, intensely, consistently, thoughtfully, with proper attention paid to form and breathing. Body-weight exercises—squats, pushups, lunges—should also be part of your routine, which is why it's smart to consult with someone knowledgeable when you're first starting. (Lifting your body weight in yoga builds strength, too!)

Expect Soreness...

It's called DOMS—delayed onset muscle soreness—and it's what you can expect after a good workout. Pain is different. "No pain, no gain" is no way to approach a sustainable strength-training practice. If your trainer thinks otherwise, find one with a bigger brain.

Know Your Body...

Spend a little time looking at anatomical drawings so you'll know your kidney from your colon, your patella from your pubic bone. Developing better body awareness will help you create and execute a balanced workout: front to back, side to side, pushing and pulling, expanding and contracting.

Be Efficient...

A 20-minute workout can be just as good as a 40-minute workout, if you know what you're doing and why. Compound movements, for example—a bicep curl combined with a lunge—will give you twice the benefit in half the time. So will super-slow lifting and high-intensity interval training. Again, study up and experiment until you find a routine that sparks joy. If you manage to do it two or three times a week, over time your body will change in remarkable ways, unless you celebrate every workout with two granola bars and three beers.

Use It Or Lose It...

It's an inconvenient truth that as we age, we lose muscle and grow weak unless we make the effort to stay strong, flexible, agile, and juiced. It's about working with what you've got for as long as you've got, and being grateful in between.

"Humans evolved as a species that walks, runs, climbs trees and hills, and uses a variety of muscles all the time. Super Salad: Commit to eating one **LARGE** salad every day for 21 days (even if it takes all day). Use Tupperware type container 3 inches deep and 8 X 8 inches square.

Leafy Greens - Mix 1 to 3 different kinds of organic greens – Romaine, mixed or spring greens, spinach, kale, arugula, etc. into container (above).

Vegetables – add at least 4-5 different vegetables – bell peppers, carrots, celery, cucumber, parsley, snap peas, green onions, leeks, tomatoes, Jicama, olives (actually a fruit), etc.

Fruit – add 1-2 fruits to the salad - berries (blue, black, raspberries, pomegranate, grapes, etc) and whole fruit sliced (apples, pears, nectarines, peaches, orange, tangerine, grapefruit, etc).

Legumes/Beans $-\frac{1}{2}$ - 1 cup organic beans (garbanzo, black, kidney, pinto, edamame, canned are acceptable). Rinse beans off in strainer before use.

Nuts/Seeds – 1-2 tablespoons of raw nuts or seeds (plus1 tblsp ground flax or chi seeds) are optional in salad. **Dressing** - Cut up wedges of oranges, lime, lemons or grapefruit – 4-6 wedges per salad. Can freshly squeezed juice directly onto salad – or - add to these juices that are freshly squeezed – dill, sea salt, garlic pepper, curry powder, bay leaves, sesame seeds. Vinegars may be used.

Super Green "Hyper-Nourishing" Smoothie (in strong blender) – (For healing, energy,

weight loss and increased metabolism) - 75% compressed greens / 25% raw or frozen berries, banana, mango, pineapple; 1 palm full (1/4 cup) raw flax or chia seeds (start with 1 tbsp/d and increase by 1 daily); water to fruit line – <u>64 oz to be consumed in a day</u>. If muscle building can add tofu, edamame, almond butter, non-soy vegan plant protein, organic nut milks (almond, oat, rice) – water total (including smoothie) 96 oz per day.

Super Simple Soup - 2-4 quarts of organic vegetable broth; chop up 3-5 different kinds of vegetables; ¹/₂ -1 cup of beans; herbs and spices (garlic, onion, sea salt, dill, basil, etc.); simmer 10-20 minutes; add 5 minutes before serving a palmful of cooked brown rice, quinoa or other non-glutinous grain. The grains may be precooked. Simmer for 5 minutes and serve.

<u>Super Simple "Lifesaver" Bean Dip</u> to Smooth Your Blood Sugar, Reduce Cravings and Provide Good Carbs, Protein and Fats – 1 – 2 cans of organic cooked beans (pinto, black, kidney,

and Provide Good Carbs, Protein and Fats -1-2 cans of organic cooked beans (pinto, black, kidney, garbonza, etc.) poured in Quisinart (food processer) or hand mash in bowl. Add juice from lemon, lime or orange (or vinegar) to taste with garlic powder (or real garlic), dill, and any other herbs and spiced to taste. Can add avocado if weight is under control, or any other juicy vegetable (tomatoes, etc.) for texture. **Blend to desired smoothness**. Use for vegetable dips, sandwich spreads, finger food, between meal hunger! (No added oils!). **NO MORE CREAMY, CHEESEY, FATTY, GOOEY DIPS!**

- Weigh yourself daily in the morning and evening and log weight on your Food-Diary.
- Do some form of aerobic exercise daily for a minimum of 15-30 minutes (pgs. 166-167).
- Sit physically still 15-30 minutes twice daily (pg. 188).
- Do some form of strength training (i.e. circuit training) 3-4 days per week (pgs. 167-177).
